WHAT'S THIS ZINE ALL ABOUT?

spill it. features qualitative responses from an exploratory research study, involving a survey and campus audit. The study aimed to document access to menstrual products and student experiences with menstruation on campus. The research was reviewed and approved by the Douglas College Research Ethics Board and data was collected between October 2019 - July 2020.

Let's get the talk about periods flowing.


"When I am changing my pad/tampon the gap In between the doors are quite big so I feel awkward when people are looking through to see if the U shall is empty and if



"It is incredibly awkward to unwrap tampons in the men's room. I can't recall if the men's stalls on campus have garbage cans in them, but most public men's stalls don't.




I would go out of my way to go to empty bathrooms or gender-neutral bathrooms."
