




She is the Tradwife.

Tradwives as we know them now first came onto the scene in the late 2010s and in the past 5 years have exploded in popularity with the rise of tradwife influencers (more on that later) on social media.

Tradwife is short for traditional housewife and they're pretty much exactly what they sound like. These women champion the virtues of behaving like the ideal woman. Which to them means ultra strict behaving like the ideal woman which to them means ultra strict gender roles, Rejecting progressive feminist ideas, leaving careers to gender roles, Rejecting progressive feminist ideas, leaving careers to gender roles, advocating for traditional focus on home making and child rearing, advocating for traditional (conservative) values and submitting to their husbands.

I want to make a quick distinction of what exactly I will be talking about in this zine. A tradwife is not a housewife, it is a not a stay at home mom. A tradwife is also not a woman who blogs about being a housewife or a stay at home mom on social media. You can do all of this and not be a tradwife. To be a tradwife means engaging in a very specific politically and ideologically conservative movement.



The proto tradwives




This concept of wemanhood didn't spring up from nowhere. The tradwife is a resurgence of older ideas, ranging from conservative politics to paganism.

One of the most obvious inspirations comes from 1950s American ideas around femininity and the nuclear family. While this is obviously an aesthetic I enjoy, the actual functional aspects of this culture that we look fondly coexisted with and in fact relied upon massive racial inequality, extreme homophobia, and widespread exploitation of women. The traditional marriages at this time stripped all autonomy from women, punished deviance from the norm and generally resulted in married women at this time reporting dramatically lower rates of mental health. According to one study at the time, "married women have higher rates of mental disorder than married men, and in most cases the preponderance of women is substantial"

According to that same study, Never married or formerly married men have higher rates of mental illness than currently married men. Generally women in this period reported less marriage satisfaction at this time than men.

"Men who are married are happy because someone is being their mommy. And men who are not married are incels."

"Tradwives serve a great purpose, they're typically skilled social media influencers who use the algorithm to their advantage, they avoid posting anything that might get them deplatformed but are masters at outrage farming. On platforms like Tiktok and Meta, tradwives promote their beliefs while still maintaining a palatable, desirable and attainable veneer of femininity and aesthetics."

The majority of the tradwife movement exists online, on spaces like Tiktok, instagram or youtube. Even the most inoffensive of tradwife content is inherently conservative. They American Christianity and 1950s whiteness,

"While most followers of this campaign are not adamant supporters of alt-right politics. The desire for a specific tradition is intrinsically preferential and exclusive, and subtly supports these white supremacist agendas."

Many articles like to use specific language to paint all tradwives as exclusively made up by the most vocal and obvious white supremacists such as the Guardian article "Meet the "TradWives" who hate feminism and adore Trump," Which states that "They abhor feminism, hate anyone LGBT, decry the disintegration of gender binaries and rail against anyone non-white. The Stepford Wives go bitterly political."

These broad stroke generalizations not only oversimplify a complex issue, they also dangerously undersell the effectiveness of the Tradwife pipeline. If every tradwife was a raving obvious bigot, they wouldn't be nearly as good at radicalizing women.

The tradwife and white supremacy



Tradwife influencers can vary greatly. There are the more mildly conservative more aestheticized tradwives, the religious evangelist tradwives, alt-right counterculture culture tradwives and even militia tradwives who combine their content with pro-gun ideology. This way women can start by consuming the less visibly extreme tradwife content, before the algorithm slowly suggests them more and more extreme content, before Sophia Sykes shares a graph illustrating the Tradwife Pipeline in depth



I should also bring up the fact that while the tradwife movement has its links to white supremacy, there is a growing subset of black women on social media who are embracing a similar lifestyle. It should be noted that for the most part these women do not identify as tradwives, instead using terms like #blackhousewife, Traditional marriage, Biblical marriage or submissive womanhood.

"I think it's important that we, as Black women, embrace a position within our homes that we were not afforded for so long. Black women were forced to work outside their home and incentivized by the U.S. government to remain unmarried. Disproportionate incarceration rates for Black men forced many Black women to raise children alone, and the list goes on."

"The idea that Black women should aspire to traditional marriage as a way out of capitalist exhaustion is a deeply flawed one, as these are the same systems that excluded us, and now this feels like another means to control us. Our inclusion is also a tool of control, as traditional marriages are also dependent on capitalism and are institutions that can hurm Black women."






The nature of "traditional marriage" amongst black women is very different compared to their tradwife counterpoints, with differing origins and motivations, but it is still contentious.

So what's the problem? Many defenders of the tradwife movement reference the idea of choice feminism. The idea that first and second wave feminists worked so hard in order to give women the right to choose. If some of them choose to stay at home and submit to their husband why shouldn't they? That's their right. Maybe all of the think pieces, reaction videos, angry comments and even this zine itself are all just a bunch of spiteful, man hating feminists being mean to these poor women because we think all women should act exactly like us. Shave your head and go to work and get gay married.





Tradwives are pitching women domestic subjugation when the real solution is economic freedom.



As an example, I want to reference the power and control circle. The Power and Control Wheel is a tool created by the Domestic Abuse Intervention Project in Duluth, MN and used by the National Domestic Violence Hotline to track patterns of domestic abuse as well as illustrating common tactic abusers use to keep survivors in abusive relationships.



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The tenants of the Tradwife movement unambiguously intersects with the wheel in three categories; Using economic abuse, using male privilege, and using isolation. (It also arguably intersects with other sections in many cases, but those similarities are less blatantly obvious.)

When you submit to a man, when you quit your job, when you devote yourself to your family at the expense of outside relationships, you lose nearly all the defenses against or escape from domestic abuse. If all the finances are controlled by a man and you ever try to leave him you may be left with no money and a lengthy gap in your resume. Were there more social safety nets in society that protected single mothers then this lifestyle would have fewer risks, but as it stands the tradwife lifestyle is not a safe possibility for the majority of women.

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
